

#### Dear Colleagues,

It is my pleasure to present your 2019 American Psychiatric Nurses Association (APNA) Annual Activity Report. I am happy to report that your association continues to enjoy sound membership growth and retention. Please see APNA Secretary Joyce Shea's report for details on membership and more. APNA has also enjoyed a strong financial year - APNA Treasurer Donna Rolin's report provides you with more information.

APNA activities are guided by a strategic direction developed by the APNA Board of Directors (BOD). Below I provide some key highlights that speak to what APNA has accomplished this year based upon the four goals set out in our strategic plan — and why those accomplishments matter to you. It is a long list, but well worth browsing. It is amazing what this dedicated group of psychiatric-mental health nurses has accomplished. Your generosity in sharing your expertise and volunteering your time enriches us all...and the proof is below!

# Goal A. APNA will be the indispensable resource for member networking, leadership, and professional development.

- APNA eLearning Center
  - 362 sessions currently available with 439.25 contact hours; 60 Sessions offered for free to members in 2019, providing the variety of tools and continuing education members need to thrive in their practice.
  - New Motivational Interviewing program launched and offered free to members as a feature of membership - 3.0 contact hours deliver core skills in motivational interviewing, a vital skill to support patient engagement and positive outcomes.
  - New APNA Certificate Program Released: Understanding the Brain-Behavior Connection
     5.0 contact hours sharpen skills in assessment and targeted intervention, improving accuracy and efficiency of care and treatment.
- Annual Conference has record in attendance this year more than 2,000 attendees will benefit from an opportunity to share community and partake in enriching education opportunities.
- At the APNA Clinical Psychopharmacology Institutes this year (CPI and CPI West) attendance totaled almost 800 attendees who received up-to-date science-based information to improve their practice.
- 9 members and a chapter recognized with APNA Annual Awards honoring member accomplishments and promoting innovation and dedication to the field.
- Board of Directors Scholars 28 rising psychiatric-mental health nursing students provided membership and conference attendance in order to support and nurture our future workforce.
- APNA Research Grants: 3 Proposals funded by the Board to seed new investigators in psychiatric-mental health nursing research and build our evidence-base.
- New Resources developed by member subject matter experts:
  - Guidance on Preceptors and Mentorship issued to help nurses understand their options when locating preceptors

- Checklist of considerations for prescribing and/or providing care to persons undergoing ketamine infusion therapy for treatment resistant depression.
- Tip sheet for new PMH nurses providing encouragement and valuable real-world advice from experienced members.
- 34 chapters covering 39 states offer local networking for members.
- 10 Active Councils working on focus areas of: addictions, administration, child & adolescent, education, forensics, mental health advocacy, practice, recovery, research, and safe environments. View their full activity reports here.
- Personality Disorders Task Force formed to develop recovery-oriented clinical pearls to destignatize and improve care for this population.
- Suicide Competencies Update Task Force formed to update the APNA Psychiatric-Mental Health Nurse Essential Competencies for Assessment and Management of Individuals at Risk For Suicide.
- Tobacco Dependence Competencies Task Force creating Nursing Competencies for Treating Tobacco and Nicotine Dependence to empower nurses in this area of treatment.

### Goal B. APNA will be the leader in creating strategic alliances with key stakeholders.

- Continued Premiere Organizational Affiliate status with American Nurses Association, organizational membership with Nursing Organizations Alliance and Nursing Community Coalition, and membership in the Mental Health Liaison Group ensure that APNA has a voice in the broader nursing and mental health communities.
- APNA awarded a two-year SAMHSA grant to deliver and test-pilot evidence-based substance use
  disorder curriculum to undergraduate and graduate nursing programs to ensure that nurses
  leaving school are educated to meet the rising substance use treatment needs of the
  population.
- Partnered with the Opioid Response Network to develop information for ALL nurses related to opioid use disorders to assist in overcoming a shortage of qualified providers and combat the opioid crisis.
- In partnership with AANA, APNA released a joint statement regarding the role of nurse anesthetists and psychiatric-mental health nurses in ketamine infusion therapy for treatment resistant depression to support implementing this therapy with a focus on patient safety, positive outcomes, and general well-being.

# Goal C. APNA will be recognized as the expert voice for psychiatric-mental health nursing to stakeholders.

- APNA in partnership with ISPN and ANA is updating the foundational document used to describe and define the profession: Psychiatric Mental Health Nursing: Scope and Standards of Practice.
- Released a report highlighting the Pivotal Role of Psychiatric-Mental Health Nurses which
  generated press coverage generated in 130+ publications increasing visibility and understanding
  of the profession.
- Workforce Task Force piloting a survey to gain a better understanding of PMH nursing workforce in order to provide accurate data that can be reported to stakeholders.
- Four papers on workforce, based on presentations from the 2018 APNA Health Policy Summit, published in January/February 2019 issue of the *Journal of the American Psychiatric Nurses Association* depict the composition of the current workforce and recommendations for expanding it to improve access to care.
- APNA Representation on national stakeholder groups includes: National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine's Forum on Mental Health and Substance Use Disorders; SAMHSA Expert Panel: Making Integrated Mental health and Substance Use Treatment Services Available to People with Co-Occurring Serious Mental Illness and Opiate Use disorder; National Quality Forum Serious Mental Illness Action Team; SAMHSA Interdepartmental Serious Mental Illness Coordinating Committee; LACE Network
- <u>Comments submitted</u> to national organizations, legislators, and regulatory bodies regarding issues impacting nursing and psychiatric-mental health
- Competency Based Training for Suicide Prevention for Acute Care Nurses Facilitator training provides nurses working in acute care settings with tools to assess and manage suicide risk with in their scope of practice.

# Goal D. APNA will be the leader in integrating research, practice, and education to address pressing mental health policy issues that affect psychiatric-mental health nursing and the population served.

- New: APNA applied and successfully competed for a SAMHSA grant to develop a substance use
  disorder curriculum to be delivered in undergraduate and graduate programs, filling a gap in
  existing programs for nursing students. Tapping into member expertise, the draft curriculum
  was developed by the APNA Addictions Council and letters of support were secured by members
  of the APNA Education Council.
- Continued expansion of free continuing education for members Free CE of the month, membership bonus points, free Motivational Interviewing Program, CE articles in the journal and more ensure that members receive evidence-based education to help meet the needs of the populations they serve.
- Online educational programs addressing the opioid crisis and patient safety have been updated to ensure content reflects the most current research and meets current needs:
  - Opioid Webinars for all nurses at RN and APRN levels (free to all nurses)
  - Medication Assisted Treatment Waiver Training 16 & 8 hour, in partnership with PCSS-MAT (free to all nurses)
  - 2019 Competency Based Training for Conducting the One Hour Face-to-Face Assessment for Patients in Restraints or Seclusion
  - o 2019 Seclusion and Restraint: Assessment and Risk Mitigation

- APNA Transitions in Practice Curriculum provides evidence-based foundational education to PMH-RNs to help improve retention, satisfaction, and outcomes: 4,089 registrations with 3,317 Certificates awarded thus far indicating the successful delivery of foundational knowledge in psychiatric-mental health nursing.
- APNA Competency-Based Training for Suicide Prevention: PMH Nurse Generalist Role: More than 3,200 participants have completed the training since its launch increasing dissemination of prevention and assessment best practices and research.
- Workforce papers addressing the current composition of the workforce and future recommendations published in January/February 2019 issue of Journal of the American Psychiatric Nurses Association.
- APNA Report, Expanding Mental Health Care Access in America: The Pivotal Role of Psychiatric-Mental Health Nurses and supplemental infographics support recruiting more nurses into the workforce and enhancing the capability of the current workforce to meet demand.
- Health Policy Summit brings together experts in workforce and from all areas of nursing to address current policy needs and strategies for meeting future needs.
- Ongoing multichannel communications highlight research, practice, education, and policy issues to mobilize grassroots advocacy

The accomplishments listed in this report are made possible by you, the members who generously give your time and expertise to help this organization support and advance psychiatric-mental health nursing and therefore the care we provide those we serve. It has been my honor serve as your APNA President over the past year.

## Dear Colleagues,

As the Secretary for the APNA Board of Directors, I am pleased to provide you with this annual update on our membership and communications over the past year.

The APNA Secretary is responsible for corporate records and taking meeting minutes during official meetings of the APNA Board of Directors. During the past year, the Board of Directors conducted face-to-face meetings on October 23, 2018, February 22, 2019, and June 5-6, 2019. Conference calls were held on October 9, 2018; November 13, 2018; December 11, 2018; January 8, 2019; February 12, 2019; March 12, 2019; April 9, 2019; May 14, 2019; July 9, 2019; August 13, 2019; and September 10, 2019.

Membership has increased since the last activity report. Based on dues revenue collected from October 1, 2018 through September 30, 2019, there has been an increase of 11.8% over the same period last year. Current membership as of September 30, 2019 is 13,874. New members from October 1, 2018 to September 30, 2019 are 3,904, and is an increase over the same period a year ago of 21.4%.

The website continues to help APNA serve as your resource for psychiatric-mental health nursing. Our website saw more than 500,000 visits this past year. APNA also continues to issue press releases, conduct press outreach, and make use of a broad range of social media platforms to disseminate information and engage with the public. New resources now available on the website thanks to the expertise found within our membership include <u>guidance</u> on precepting and mentorship, a <u>checklist</u> providing considerations for prescribing or providing care to persons undergoing ketamine infusion therapy, and a <u>tip sheet</u> for new nurses.

Understanding that enhancing the image of our profession is a priority for building our future workforce, this year APNA issued a <u>report</u> that highlights the pivotal role of psychiatric-mental health nurses to the public. Press outreach around this report resulted in media coverage in more than 130 outlets, including several in-depth interviews with APNA President Gail Stern. To see some highlights from this press coverage, <u>click here</u>.

Since its launch in 2011, your resource for online continuing nursing education, the <u>APNA</u> <u>eLearning Center</u>, continues to grow in scope and reach. More than 362 sessions are available to access online, altogether offering 439.25 contact hours. 'Free CE of the Month' provides members with access to four free CE podcasts each month. Notably, this year updated several key programs to ensure continued relevance: The Effective Treatments for Opioid Use Disorders <u>series</u>, the Medication Assisted Treatment Waiver Training <u>webinars</u>, our <u>suicide prevention</u> <u>trainings</u>, and more. APNA also released a new certificate program this year which focuses on sharpening PMH nursing skills of assessment and intervention using principles of neurobiology:

# <u>Understanding the Brain Behavior Connection</u>.

Our online community site <u>Member Bridge</u> continues to offer much for members. The community provides more than 95,000 resources, discussion posts, and blogs and members have logged in more than 780,000 times to access this content. This year, members sent more than 23,000 messages and wrote more than 7,000 posts in their communities. This site serves an excellent repository for the collective wisdom, experiences, and concerns shared by the profession.

I hope that you will join me in celebrating the incredible growth in that we have seen this past year – it is a collective effort that reflects the dedication and expertise of you, the APNA membership.





# APNA Education Report June 2019

### **New Accreditation Language from ANCC:**

The American Nurses Credentialing Center's Commission on Accreditation has issued a new accreditation statement for continuing nursing education. The updated language is intended to promote professional development in nursing and to be inclusive of nursing education related to nonclinical settings like policy and academic education. The new statement will appear on all continuing professional development certificates: *The American Psychiatric Nurses Association is accredited with distinction as a provider of nursing continuing professional development by the American Nurses Credentialing Center's Commission on Accreditation.* 

### **APNA Transitions in Practice Certificate Program**

The APNA Transitions in Practice (ATP) Certificate program is an educational offering by APNA to deliver foundational psychiatric mental health (PMH) knowledge that RNs need for transition into mental health practice settings.

- Bulk Proposal Orders: 92 organizations purchased a combined total of 3,100 seats

#### Competency Based Training for Suicide Prevention: PMH Nurse Generalist - Chapter programs

- 15 APNA Chapters provided the APNA suicide prevention training in 2019.
- 1 more chapter is in the planning process to hold the *Competency Based Training for Suicide Prevention: PMH Nurse Generalist* in 2019.
- As of 8/31/2019 chapter trainings have had 1,226 participants

### **Competency Based Training for Suicide Prevention: PMH Nurse Generalist**

- APNA Facilitator Trainings
  - 81 facilitators completed course since 2015
- More than 3,200 nurses and other professionals have been trained since September 2016
- Comments from attendees:
  - "Very powerful educational experience that should be mandatory for all hospital personnel that come in contact with patients in any capacity."
  - "Due to this training, I have a deeper understanding of the evaluation I am conducting, as well as am familiar with ways to ask questions that will provoke more thought and honesty."
  - "I appreciated this training and was able to utilize skills I learned the very same night while on call in the ED."
  - "Very good content, should be given to all staff."
  - "Plan to continue to have the patient fill out their own safety plan when necessary, review safety plans of all my patient's prior to providing care"

#### Competency Based Training for Suicide Prevention – Acute Care Settings

This program was adapted from the original *Competency Based Training for Suicide Prevention: PMH Nurse Generalist Role* one-day training. The intent of the program is so all nurses can be a part of suicide prevention.

- A facilitator-led 1.5 hour live, interactive course
- Provides foundational knowledge to non-PMH nurses regarding phenomenology of suicide, risk factors, warning signs, safety plan and creating a safe environment.
- Meets CMS Meaningful Measures (Making Care Safer, Promote Effective Prevention & Treatment of Chronic Disease and Promotes Effective Communication & Coordination of Care)
- Workbooks and slides have been updated to include the July 2019 Joint Commission National Patient Safety Goal 15.01.01: Suicide requirements
- Uses an algorithm:
  - Help assess and determine risk
  - o Be able to communicate and document the risk and safety interventions.

#### **Inquiries & Training**

• Since January 2019: 92 organizational inquiries related to leasing the program

- As of August, 2019:
  - o 2 organizations have leased the program, 1 organization is piloting the program
  - 6 facilitators have been trained (2 at each of 3 organizations)
  - o 43 registrants have completed the live 1.5-hour training
  - 2 organizations are in contract discussions

## **Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) Training for Nurses**

Under the 2016 Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (CARA) Nurse Practitioners (NPs) are eligible to obtain a MAT waiver after completing 24 hours of approved coursework. On September 25, 2018, the House and Senate approved legislation that will permanently authorize NPs to prescribe MAT and will extend authorization to Clinical Nurse Specialists (CNSs) until October 1, 2023. The bill was signed into law by President Donald Trump October 24, 2018.

- All healthcare providers must obtain MAT waivers from the DEA to prescribe buprenorphine, (one of three FDA-approved medications for treating opioid use disorders)
- Two FREE online courses, (24 hours total) meet educational requirements for APRNs to obtain MAT waivers
- In partnership with the Providers' Clinical Support System (PCSS), APNA offers CNE credit for the MAT waiver courses.
- The 24-hour course content is currently being reviewed and updated in communication with American Academy of Addiction Psychiatry (AAAP) and APNA.
  - o Delivery of the updated courses is planned for December, 2019
  - Annual meeting discussion focused on 1. Need for a Substance Use Disorder curriculum, and 2. "The Exchange" program (mentoring-bi-monthly live interdisciplinary topic driven chat sessions) to be launched in 2020.

#### **Collaborative Projects**

#### **APA CSS-SMI Project**

APNA is collaborating with APA as the nursing CE provider for this 5 year grant funded project. Education on SMI evidence-based practices is made available at no charge to a multidisciplinary audience of providers. In the first year (July 2018-July 2019) a total of 11 webinars were produced. All webinars produced after Sept 1, 2019 will use the new ANCC language of Nursing Continuing Professional Development (CNPD) activities/hours in place of CNE.

Since the beginning of this project, there has been a noted increase in all participants, and specifically of nurses. The 7.11.19 live activity, First Episode Schizophrenia-Spectrum Disorders: What Clinicians Need to Know, had a total of 60 participants, 15 of those claimed CNE credit. 
# **APNA 2019 Annual Activity Report Treasurer's Report**


Dear Colleagues,

I am pleased to provide the APNA Treasurer's Report for the most recent fiscal year, 2018. The audited financial statements for the year ending December 31, 2018 can be found in the Appendix. This report shows the complete APNA financial position to include foundation activities. All APNA financials are under the stewardship of the APNA Board of Directors The results show a total negative return from operations of \$367,500.


In an effort to oversee the integrity of its financial statements and maintain a system of internal control, APNA established an Audit Committee including Jeanne Clement, Ben Evans, Rick Pessagno and Avni Cirpili. The committee's responsibilities include reviewing the results of the audited financial statements with the independent auditing firm annually. Last year's audit resulted in a "clean" opinion with no material misstatements.


In addition to the statements discussed above, we have prepared the following charts reflecting the revenues and expenses and the net operating results from January 1, 2005 through December 31, 2018.





The Board of Directors functions as the investment committee for APNA funds. It utilizes the services of an investment manager who invests the funds in accordance with the APNA investment policy. The investment policy calls for a diversification of funds with moneys invested in cash, equities, bonds and real estate. The following charts show the results of APNA investments from July 2003 through August 2019. APNA investments have returned a total of \$1,159,875 over that period.
